National Family Literacy Month



Teachers,

November is National Family Literacy Month – a time to focus on special activities and events that showcase the importance of family literacy programs. As a celebration gift to you, our activity of the month for November has been created for you to share with parents and caregivers.

Parents & Caregivers,

Experiencing your child's growth as a reader is an exciting and rewarding time. One of the strongest supports you can offer as your child creates positive reading habits is to model the importance of literacy and reading. We invite you to partner with your child's school to celebrate National Family Literacy Month by fostering strong reading behaviors that will last a lifetime! **Are you up for the challenge?**

Getting Started

Critical Thinking Trait Focus—Strive: Prepare to talk with your child during the activity about the **Strive** critical thinking trait and how they can use this trait to conquer the Family Literacy Challenge.



Strive—I use effort and determination to focus on challenging tasks.

Vocabulary—Try to incorporate some related vocabulary into casual conversation as you and your child **Strive** to conquer the Family Literacy Challenge.

- Challenge—a difficult task or problem
- Literacy—the ability to read and write
- Habit—something that a person does often in a regular and repeated way
- Criteria—used as a reason for making a judgment or decision
- Genre—type or category of literature or art
- Conquer—to gain control of (a problem or difficulty) through great effort

Materials—Think It Out!

Preparation—Start by creating a positive atmosphere. Find a comfortable place away from distractions. Consider your child's preferred [thinking and learning environment](#). Encourage closeness during reading time. This serves a dual purpose of strengthening the bond between a child and caregiver, as well as creating positive feelings related to the act of reading.



Instruction

Activity Directions:

The goal is to build positive reading feelings and habits.

1. Invite your child to choose titles each day to complete the challenge on the Think It Out! page.
2. Guide your child as they fulfill the criteria for each line item.
3. Experience each selection with your child. Ask and answer questions, offer your response to the literature, and invite your child's feedback.

A Note About Developing the **Strive** Trait:

As your child faces challenges, they might reach a frustrating moment of "What I tried isn't working." To support this stage:

- Encourage your child to pinpoint the source of their failed attempt.
- Talk with your child about failure. Reassure them that failure is simply an opportunity to learn.
- Adopt a positive, lighthearted approach as you encourage your child to explore new solutions.

Reflect

After your family has used the **Strive** trait to conquer the Family Literacy Challenge, reflect on your journey. Use purposeful discussion points to help your child identify ways to maintain focus when they face a challenging task such as: "What helped us stick to the challenge on days when it was tough to keep our reading routine?"
